As a student of this course, you'll study topics such as:

You'll learn to work with patients of all ages in different environments. There is a focus on aged care, community, and mental health.

You'll also learn how to administer intravenous medications and gain the skills in acute care, which involves medical and surgical nursing skills.

You'll also get technology-enhanced learning experiences using simulation laboratories and a new web-based simulation.

This combined with a minimum of 400 hours of work placement (equivalent of up to 12 weeks) ensures that you will be work-ready.

Year 1

Your first year of studies will cover:

- basic anatomy and physiology
- wound management
- training in cultural diversity and coping with challenging behaviour
- infection control
- legal and ethical parameters of nursing
- patient assessment.
- complete five to six weeks of clinical placement.

Year 2

In your second year you will:

- develop analytical skills as you learn to care for patients with acute and chronic conditions
- be introduced to medication and intravenous administration
- learn how to implement nursing care plans and to evaluate the care provided
- complete four to five weeks of clinical placement.

RMIT - Epworth Healthcare partnership

Students accepted into the <u>C5365EPW stream</u> have the opportunity to study whilst embedded in the Epworth Healthcare environment.

Within a supervised work placement over 18 months, students will reinforce the theory and skills learned through RMIT while gaining real-world experience in a healthcare environment.

Upon completion of this diploma, students of this stream are guaranteed an interview for an ongoing professional role with Epworth Healthcare, including the Epworth Richmond and Freemasons Graduate Program.

Professional recognition

RMIT's Diploma of Nursing is a nationally accredited qualification. Upon graduation, you can register with the National Health Practitioners Regulation Agency AHPRA, allowing you to work anywhere in Australia.

Further study

Graduates of this course may be eligible for exemptions from the <u>Bachelor of Nursing</u>, subject to meeting the entry requirements. A bachelor degree will allow you to work as a registered nurse.

Year 1

What you will study

This course is for registered nurses with at least 840 hours (approximately six months) experience working in mental health clinical practice, or currently completing a graduate year in mental health nursing.

This diploma will give you an understanding of applying diagnostic and therapeutic techniques in your clinical practice, as well the broader professional and social context of mental health nursing. You will also develop research skills and the ability to be reflective of your practice.

A work-integrated learning subject will further develop your skills caring for clients in a variety of clinical settings with interaction and feedback from industry.

- Leadership and Management
- Loss, Trauma and Grief

The face-to-face contact at RMIT develops strong clinical skills in child health and enables regular support and discussion to enhance learning.



How you will study

This graduate diploma is available on-campus but includes units with significant online modules that can be studied from home. It also includes 300 hours of clinical placements and visits.

Units are mostly offered in full-day attendance mode. You will experience a range of learning approaches including learner-centred curriculum, learning activities and projects.

Your learning will be further supported by face-to-face lectures, some online learning, independent study and clinical experiences across a range of early childhood services.

What you will study

The Graduate Diploma in Child and Family Health Nursing consists of 96 credit points, which you will need to complete in order to successfully complete your qualification.

You'll also select and complete one elective from the following:

- Context of Mental Health Nursing
- Parent-Infant Mental Health
- Foundations of Mental Health Nursing Partnerships
- Therapeutic Initiatives in Mental Health
- Health Inquiry Critique
- University Postgrad Elective

Relevant and industry-based learning

RMIT University is at the forefront of nursing education and research, and its focus on industry-based, practical learning is realised in the design and outcomes of the graduate diploma.

To meet curriculum requirements, you will be required to complete a minimum of 300 hours of clinical experience in approved early childhood services. While most experience occurs in approved MCH centres, almost one-third of your clinical experience will include observations and visits to community agencies.

These include childcare centres, early intervention services, early parenting centres, MCH Line, community day stay programs and other key services.

Entry requirements

This course is for registered nurses (with qualifications as midwives) who meet <u>all</u> of the following requirements:

- an Australian bachelor degree in Nursing, or equivalent;
- an Australian Graduate Diploma in Midwifery, or Bachelor of Midwifery, or equivalent;
- current registration with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) as both a Nurse (Division 1, General) and Midwife (General);
- completed a minimum of 1 year (full-time equivalent)
 post-registration clinical experience as a registered nurse
 and 1 year (full-time equivalent) post-registration clinical
 experience as a registered midwife (2 years total);
- demonstrated recent clinical experience, defined as a minimum of 1 year (full-time equivalent) employment within the last 5 years as a registered nurse OR a registered midwife.

Applicants will also be required to meet a number of immunisarion and compliance requirements, and provide a valid Police Check and Working with Children Check prior to undertaking any clinical components of the program.
